
In the concessions stand, students had to tend to being a cashier, supplying the food and drinks, and making the pretzels and nachos.

The nachos and pretzels either needed one or two people depending on the size of the line, the nachos would be tended to by having multiple plates full of nachos and cheese, hot and ready. The pretzels needed multiple batches onto different plates with cups of cheese ready.

This work would fund trips that sport teams and programs like JROTC go on. These are planned out beforehand, so that the school administration knows when the fundraisers are happening and can find a way to help.

Starting 2nd quarter the phone policy has changed because last quarter some students chose to be on their phones rather than paying attention in class and doing their work. Also teachers had to call Mrs. Miner and Mr. Lavalle to go to classes to take away phones because some students would refuse to give up their phones. The rules changed from three warnings to no warnings. This means if teachers see a student with his/her phone out they can take it and give it to the front office, who keeps it for the rest of the day.

Mrs. Miner said, "Although I think students are upset right now, I'm hoping it will help them be more focused in classes, and then we'll also cut down on some of the bullying that is happening over social media. Three warnings was really difficult to manage for teachers when multiple students had multiple warnings at the same time, and it just wasn't being followed. I would go into classrooms for observations and many students would be on their phones. This decision was made to help students."

Hilary Oscar said, "I think the phone policy is better, but I don't understand the earbuds, who are my earbuds bothering? And when I am finished with all my work and have good grades I should be able to at least look at my phone or have free time. The school has more important things to worry about, and we're in high school."

Mr. Jung said, "I fully support the phone policy. I've been taking away phones and earbuds for years and keeping them for the rest of the school day. It's something I've been doing as a teacher here at BRHS, and I've always had pretty good success with students not being on their phones and not having their airpods in.



It is important to us because it makes us who we are and we never want to lose our language and land. Our Elders are proud of us for keeping our culture alive and happy that it was possible for us to dance. I love to dance because it runs down in our family even if I am the only one in our household who dances. I am happy to yuraq because it relieves our stress and any emotions that we don't want to feel.

my class hour"


I'd just like to say that biology is a great class, and was one of my truly favorite classes to take. Now that I passed biology I miss having that class.


Picture of Niels Bohr and his model of an atomic structure. This one is a model of a Nitrogen atom

While the guys get ready to go out hunting, we have to get ready for food and snacks for the guys to eat. We pick blueberries until our buckets are full. Then we make food for the guys to eat before they get back.
