The Bartlett High School course the cross country runners ran on was really muddy and hilly, but they ran through it. For the girls, Payton Boney placed 26th with the time of 23:51, Fiona Phelan got 29th with the time of 24:16, Jordan Klejka came in 47th her time was 26:02, Cadence Cedars placed 48th with the time of 26:03, Maya Komulianen got 54th place and her time was 27:05, Alqaq Small came in 55th place with the time of 27:05, and Beth Hensley placed 60th with the time of 32:05.

Cadence Cedars said, "I tried my best, but I was struggling on the last few hills of the course. It wasn't exactly how I wanted my last race to turn out. My favorite part of the trip for me was playing black jack with the team."

Mrs. Lamb








Mr. Glasheen



Students study horror unit in LA II by Joseph Jarrett




Language Arts students learn about Edgar Allan Poe and his story *The Tell-Tale Heart*. Photo by Ms. Speranza.



BRHS is very grateful for the Foods and Nutrition class, it teaches more than what's in a book, but how to helps students in life.




U.S. History
